

Immigrants to Canada

- "Nearly one in four people in Canada are immigrants, the highest proportion of the population in more than 150 years"
- Aimed to continue welcoming immigrants at a rate of about 1% of Canada's population per year
- Canada has become a place of new opportunities for many newcomers



Canada is on track to welcome a record 431,000 immigrants

Before Moving to Canada

- Visit the official website of your new city
- Have your employment credentials evaluated
- Collect official school documents
- Estimate your monthly living expenses
- Arrange for medical insurance
- Order Canadian currency
- Create a list of what you will be bringing to Canada
- Gather essential documents
 - Make copies for yourself

I Just Arrived (0-6 Months)

- Find a place to stay
- Get your SIN at Service Canada
- Canadian phone number
- Presto Card
- Setup your finances
 - Majority of the big banks offer a New-Comer bundle
- Medical Care
- Register your children for school
- Look for work

I'm Settling In (6+ Months)

- Find a permanent home
- Get a driver's license
- Improve your languages skills
- Get to know your community



Banking Dos and Don'ts

Dos

- Setup your finances
 - Open a Canadian Bank account
 - CIBC, TD Bank, BMO, RBC, Scotia
- Build credit score
 - Apply for a credit card
 - Make sure to make your payments on time
 - Try to utilization only 40-50% of the credit available on the credit
- Start saving
 - Build an emergency fund
 - Save towards your goals

Don'ts

- Open too many bank accounts at different institutions
 - Can get overwhelming
 - Multiple monthly fees to maintain
- Apply for multiple credit cards
 - Each credit check will affect your score
 - Easy way to put yourself into debt
- Spend more than what you can afford
- Share banking information with others (including family members)


